## Why are we here?

- To provide an overview of our federal funding available each year and eligible uses of each fund.
- To hear from you about the housing and community development needs and priorities within the county.



#### What is a Consolidated Plan?

- 5-year Consolidated Plan (Con Plan) describes a jurisdiction's community development <u>priorities</u> and multiyear <u>goals</u> based on an assessment of housing and community development needs, an analysis of housing and economic market conditions and available resources.
- Required to be completed by all HUD entitlement communities.



## Consolidated Plan Process/Requirements

The Consolidated Plan is designed to help jurisdictions to assess their affordable housing and community development needs and market conditions, and to make data-driven, place-based investment decisions.

#### **Consolidated Plan**

- HUD entitlement grant programs are administered through the Consolidated Plan (ConPlan)
  - Managed through HUD's Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) Online
- Helps grantees <u>determine activities</u> and organizations to fund in the coming years.
- Describes community needs, resources, priorities, and proposed activities to be undertaken under certain HUD program for the following five years.

#### **Annual Action Plan**

- The Annual Action Plan (AP) is submitted to HUD every year during the five-year ConPlan cycle.
- Describes the specific planned uses for HUD programs, and other program requirements.

#### Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER).

Grantees report on accomplishments and progress toward Consolidated Plan goals in the prior year.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) Program

Flexible funding source that can be used for a variety of activities targeted towards low to moderate income individuals, households and neighborhoods (80% Area Median Income and below). Eligible uses include:

- Public Infrastructure Improvements
- Public Facilities Improvements
- Rehabilitation of residential and non-residential buildings
- Acquisition of land or real property to be used for eligible purposes
- Economic Development Activities
- Public Services (15%)
- Planning and Administration (20%)

#### CDBG National Objectives

- The authorizing statute of the CDBG program:
  - 1. Benefit to low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons;
  - 2. Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight; and
  - 3. Meet a particular urgency (referred to as urgent need).

\*Primary National Objective is LMI 70% of CDBG funds to benefit LMI persons







## Low/Mod Limited Clientele Benefit

- Activities that benefit specific populations
- Options for meeting limited clientele:
  - 1. Presumed clientele
    - See next slide
  - 2. Requires 51% of participants are documented as LMI
    - Example: Public services targeting Low/Mod
  - 3. Activity participation limited to LMI only
    - Example: Community Health clinic offering free or reduced fee services
  - 4. Nature and location indicate low/mod benefit
    - Example: Soup kitchen / Day shelter for homeless

## Presumed Clientele (Special Needs)

- Elderly
- Severely Disabled <u>Adults</u>
- Battered Spouses
- Abused Children
- Homeless Persons
- Migrant Farm Workers
- Persons with AIDS
- Illiterate Adults






#### Area Benefit

- Area census tract must be primarily low/mod income
- Activities that benefit all residents of area
- Typical activities: water/sewer lines, parks, community centers
- Area must be primarily residential








# Examples of Infrastructure Projects

#### Citizen Participation

- Citizens have a voice in determining the Priority Needs to be addressed using or CDBG funds
- Regulations stipulate that grantees must meet citizen participation requirements:
  - o Grantee must hold at least two public hearings a year to obtain citizens' feedback
  - A summary of the proposed plan will be published
  - 30-day period for citizen review and comment
  - Public comments must be given consideration
